

At a recent meeting of the Silver Valley Ministerial Society, Judy Blalack of the Fuller Center had opportunity to meet the new facilitator for the Society, Scott Ross. Scott has recently taken on the role of Chaplain of the Shoshone County Sheriff's Office and has agreed to facilitate the organization and meetings of the Society. Judy was able to share some of the vision and purpose of the Fuller Center and the need for volunteers and work projects for the 2016 project year. As well, the members of the Society were able to share with Judy the theme of "Dare to Imagine" which is the focus of much of what the Society is hoping to accomplish into the future.

"Dare to Imagine"

This is a claxon that has sounded in the Silver Valley for the last couple of years. A group in the valley that has taken on this slogan as a focus to breathe new energy into its existence is the Silver Valley Ministerial Society. The Silver Valley Ministerial Society has been a part of the community for years and has been a "Steady Eddie" of spiritual focus for many of the pastors of the region. Now the Society has come together, invigorated to do some of its own imagining. Do we dare to imagine and if we do, are we willing to act on those imaginations?

Dare to imagine -- A Silver Valley where the churches of the valley believe and then act on the idea of taking care of one another and do joint ministry together,

Dare to imagine – A Silver Valley that is known for its spiritual health and well-being instead of some of the darker issues that have made recent headlines and take up so much of the community resources,

Dare to imagine – A Silver Valley where the churches of the valley have jointly put feet to their imaginations. That is precisely what is happening with the Silver Valley Ministerial Society. An excitement of inclusion and involvement is growing in the members. Each first Thursday of the month the members meet at Good Samaritan in Silverton to push forward the many projects it has taken on. As well, the members explore how to build the networking of the churches of the valley with a goal of improving the spiritual health of the Silver Valley. Can we even dare to imagine that the Silver Valley could one day be known as a spiritual haven for its citizens? Some of the projects that the Ministerial Society is presently working on in a new and excited cooperative manner are; Day of Hope, Dare to Imagine summer camp, Teacher's Appreciation Day, Police Officers' Appreciation Day, and working to bring Christian Aid Society coming under the oversight of the Ministerial Society. Any pastor, youth pastor, minister or clergy are invited to come and attend the meetings and become a part of seeing the Silver Valley reached with the gospel. In addition, ministries of the valley that would like to attend and take a few minutes to share their particular vision, needs and goals are invited to attend. 




