Silver Valley Habitat Will Join the Fuller Center for Housing

At July's Board Meeting, the SV Habitat's directors voted unanimously to join the organization founded by Millard and Linda Fuller in 2005 after they left Habitat for Humanity. The Fullers, who had founded Habitat, disagreed with the policy changes that Habitat for Humanity International ® instituted. Instead of the "grassroots" approach, HfHI was becoming more corporate. Thus, when we were required last year to sign an agreement with HfHI, which we felt impinged on our autonomy, we refused. Last fall, we were granted our own 501(C)3 non-profit status with the IRS and officially changed our name to Silver Valley Habitat. As of the end of June, according to the deadline for signing the agreement, we no longer are an affiliate with Habitat for Humanity International®.

I spoke to Millard a couple months before he died last spring. He mentioned that we could not have Habitat as part of our name if we joined the Fuller Center for Housing (FCfH) as that was part of the agreement signed when he founded the new organization. Thus, we will need to resubmit a name change with the Idaho Sec. of State and insure our Employee Tax Number (EIN) is no longer associated with Habitat.

I'm excited to be joining this new venture. We will be the first Fuller Center Partner in Idaho. The idea is gradually expanding west from Americus, Georgia, where the Fuller Center is located [and where Habitat was originally founded]. In the west, there is only one partner organization in Montana & another in California. But, I don't feel abandoned as the western affiliates did when Habitat closed all the support centers in the west. We have received welcoming messages and calls from several FCfH officials and a special welcome from Glen Barton, Director, US Field Operations who plans to first set up conference meetings and actually come out to do workshops with our board.

One of the factors that swayed our vote is our need for outside help. We would not still be constructing the most "Habitat type" homes per population in Idaho without it. Since we will not be able to approach the HfHI Care-A-Vanners as we have for 15 years, I'm looking forward to working with the Fuller Center's new RV Builder's program. Glen commented that we would "become our flag ship RV Builder's host site! :-)"

What a Month!

Thanks to Clint Kunze's Shoshone Base Camp (SBC) volunteers and Habitat Care-A-Vanners at the end of June all the exterior walls were up and sheathed. Plus, almost all the interior walls were up.

Then Nathan Lake and his friends, Gary Lunsford and Chucky, pulled the trusses on top of the walls <u>by hand</u>, raised them, and sheathed the roof!

During the next week, a 12-member SBC crew led by Jim Taylor and his anonymous helper roofed the home and built a 36' long retaining wall.

In the last two weeks of June, Rick Gilbert supervised 12-member SBC crews in installing most of the vinyl siding, the soffits, and the doors and windows.

The SBC weekly crews consist of 2 adults and 6 teenagers. In June they sent us 2 crews for two weeks Monday through Thursday and for one week Monday through Wednesday. Bob Larson usually took 4 volunteers to work on the "Little Shop" on the Furniture Exchange parking lot while Jim or Rick took the rest. I cannot over emphasize the talent it takes to teach 12 untrained volunteers how to build a house!

You have to explain what's to be done, why it's being done, and then demonstrate how to do it, and then coach them while they're learning. Furthermore, you're usually working on more than one task at a time.

You often go home tired as it is mentally as well as physically exhausting. HOWEVER, you also go home proud because of what you've taught people to do. Even more important is the increased confidence you've instilled in the volunteers you've led. As Jim Taylor told me at the end of one day, "I've got good news and bad news. The bad news is that me and anonymous could have put on that much roofing ourselves. The good news is that this morning that boy was apprehensive about getting on the roof and now he's dancing around up there!"

In July, we were blessed with two great leaders teaching wonderful Shoshone Base Camp volunteers how to build an affordable home.


Tickets will be for sale at our booth during Pinehurst Days and later around the valley businesses.


