More than 30 people spent four hours hauling railroad ties, shoveling dirt, moving rocks, spreading soil, planting trees and flowers, sawing, hammering, digging, and loving. Much was accomplished with such an amazing work crew! An eroding hillside was secured with new vegetation, terraced planter boxes were designed and built to stop the erosion on another hill, and trees were
