#### **Furniture Fire**

Any change, even a change for the better, is always accompanied by drawbacks and discomforts.

--Arnold Bennett, English novelist

There's been a major change in your home you probably didn't even notice. Over the last generation, the make-up of home furnishings has changed dramatically bringing an entirely new and dangerous threat from fire.

Unlike the wood and natural fabric furniture that was in your grandmother's house, today's furnishings are made predominantly from synthetic materials whose base is highly flammable petrochemicals: polyurethane foam padding, engineered wood with flammable glues, and both rigid and flexible plastic finishes. Even the fabric on your favorite overstuffed chair may be highly flammable if not treated with fire retardant processes.

If these materials catch fire (perhaps from a carelessly dropped cigarette, a flying spark or an unattended hot appliance) the chances of the fire spreading quickly are significant. Even worse, the dense black smoke from these materials is full of highly toxic gases that can kill you with just a few breaths in only a few seconds. The list of these gases (carbon monoxide, hydrogen sulfide, hydrogen cyanide, and sulfuric acid, just to name a few) reads like a witches' brew of toxics.

Underwriter's Laboratories, a national testing lab, conducted a side-by-side fire test of two prototypical living rooms: one with modern furniture, the other with "legacy" furnishings. The test can be seen at

https://www.ul.com/room\_fire/room\_fire.html. Both rooms were ignited by placing a lit stick candle on the side of the sofa. The fires were allowed to grow until flashover, where the ceiling temperature reaches about 1100° F. The modern room reached flashover in 3 minutes and 30 seconds and the legacy room at 29 minutes and 30 seconds.

What does that mean for you and your family's safety? Given today's furnishings, you should evacuate immediately if your smoke alarm sounds or if you discover a fire. Don't think that your smoke alarm will give you time to get up in the middle of the night, get dressed, investigate the noise, and try to take some heroic action like trying to put the fire out.

Here are a few simple reminders:

- Check your smoke alarm(s) regularly. Replace batteries at least once a year.
- Smoke alarms more than ten years old should be replaced.

- ❖ In the event of a fire, get out and stay out.
- ❖ Let the trained fire fighters in their protective clothing and breathing apparatus take care of the fire.


