What's Happening At The Work Site?

This year's work site is mainly at 204 Hill St. in Smelterville. That's between B & C streets south of the main drag (near the hill). On the site, there is a house that (I'm told) was built in 1930. It obviously has been added on to at least three times. It has a full unfinished basement that has seven small rooms with ceiling heights under seven feet, meaning that no bedrooms, kitchens, or bathrooms can be located there. However, a laundry room does exist, and the other rooms can be used for storage. Upstairs we have 2 bedrooms, a bathroom, dining room, a living room, and 4 closets. A small open porch is entrance on the front and an enclosed entry porch is located at the back. A double garage adjoins the back alley and there is a small storage building in need of much repair. The front yard is enclosed with a four foot high chain link fence.

The homeowner-to be, Darnell Kreideman, is employed at Wal-Mart and the site was purchased so that she could save on transportation costs. It was purchased from HUD (Housing & Urban Development) for \$35,000. Jeff Crawford of Systems Design replaced the old gas furnace with a high efficiency one and replaced the old electric water heater with a gas one. He ran the gas lines so that we can replace the electric dryer and range with gas appliances. Electrical energy is now twice as expensive as natural gas.

Kevin Hutchings and Swede Little have replaced almost all the old plumbing and Swede and Lydia Walker have been working on the bathroom walls.

Bob Larson, Chris Leetch and Sharon Asher have framed a 2X4 wall inside the exterior walls of the basement with help from our homeowners-to-be, Darnell and Ben & Jacki Huber. We also have occasional help from Mike Humphrey, Don Ashcraft, and Kyle Kreideman. Now that the walls are framed, they are helping me rewire the house to meet the ever-changing electrical codes.

When the rough-in wiring is finished and inspected, we can insulate the basement walls. We will also build and attach a 2X6 insulated wall onto the exterior of the home and add more insulation in the attic. Super energy efficiency homes are needed by our low-income homeowners. Also, we don't build garages for them in order to enable these families to have an affordable home. Thus, we are seriously thinking about deducting the value of the garage from the cost of the site and using it for storage and for a work site since it has its own electric meter.

Low Income Family Home Construction (1/4 to 1/2 median income)

- ❖ 17 homes completed—17 families now paying taxes and becoming an integral part of our communities
- ❖ 1 of 4 building permits purchased in the Valley since Jan 1, 2011, for new or rehab homes—this one is located in Smelterville
- Footings poured for another home at Sunnyslopes.
- ❖ Collaborating with Shoshone Co. Housing (providing land in Mullan) for another low income home.
- We build "green" with extra insulation, thus lowering utility bills.

Providing opportunities for visitors to discover our area—thus becoming our ambassadors elsewhere.

- ❖ RV Builders in June—we still hear and receive donations from our first helpers in 1994! and from others since then ⑤. Many RVers return.
- ❖ "Ride the Wall" attracts many riders from N. ID, Wash., & some other states.
- ❖ Fuller Center Bike Adventure will bring about 30 riders going from Olympia to Washington, DC. They arrive on June 17th, will work on construction on the 18th, and attend churches on the 18th.

Education *** We provide instruction! ***

- We train our families how to become good homeowners—legal issues; repair; & especially in budgeting.
- ❖ We spend parts of 7 or 8 weeks each summer working with youth from the Shoshone Base Camp on our construction sites. [Since we now are doing "Greater Blessings Projects" (when we have funds), we will have more sites.]
- The Bike Group will be mostly untrained.
- We have hosted various high schools, NIC, & U of I groups.
- We work with "Community Service" people needing to put in their hours.
- We are willing to train volunteers who come to the work site.

LEARNING AS WE GO

When our housing ministry was in its beginnings, the dream of community volunteers coming together and helping low income families build a simple, decent, affordable home was wonderful! That dream, after 17 years and 17 homes is still wonderful. Usually associated with that dream is a visual image of happily driving nails and raising walls. Even I (the old stoic) have to admit that building and raising the walls is fun. Volunteers also enjoy destroying things. In order to build our first home (Bob and Lisa Lane's) we had to remove their old shack. The weather was helpful and removal went well.

Then, one Saturday, the Board decided to personally join in on the fun of making the dream come true. That day it rained and ditches were dug with picks and shovels. Some of the Directors never worked on the actual site again! They made worthy contributions elsewhere: choosing families, raising funds, publicizing our efforts, etc. None-the-less, they frequently found unexpected challenges there also. Fortunately, overcoming challenges make you not only wiser, but also more self confident until you actually look forward to challenges because you know you'll be able to overcome them and learn something new in the process that will help you in the future.

Over the years we've realized that some of the family members, like some of our Board members, aren't very anxious to help build a home. In one family the parents couldn't agree on whether they should make their teenager sons work. As a result, the lazy sons never worked, (although I noticed they weren't reluctant to live there when they became adults!). In another family, I noticed that the wife rarely showed up at the job site until the home was nearly finished. I suspect she never really believed the dream would come true until it was almost a reality.

Anyway, at the last Board meeting the Board passed a resolution that no new families will be selected unless they agree that, if possible, all able family members 13 years and older will have to work an average of 6 hours per week until the home is completed. Henceforth, building a home will always be a family affair. Not only do we hope that this will help bond the family together, but we know that it will nullify the resentment of many of our volunteers who are giving up their time (and money) to help build a home for family members who are not willing to work themselves.
