

WE'VE HIRED CARPENTRY SUPERVISORS

Before we started the ReUse Store, we only hired professionals as needed such as licensed electricians and gas furnace installers. The carpentry supervision was done by myself as a volunteer or by paid employees. I (by cramming in the code books and consulting with the inspectors) saw that the paid carpentry supervisors were following the building codes.

Now, however, as I have ReUse Store obligations as well as construction obligations which occur simultaneously, we're forced to hire carpentry supervisors as employee leaders to finish our home repairs, i.e. "Greater Blessings", projects. I must remain as the ReUse Store leader as we can't afford to pay a supervisor there, whereas home repair recipients usually pay us back as they have promised to do.

Presently we have a paid supervisor leading the repairs on a Kingston home, paid supervisors leading the repairs on two Kellogg homes and will have a paid employee fixing some leaks on the Reuse Store roof.

Any volunteers, whether experienced or not, would make these repairs less expensive for the home owners involved. If you are willing to volunteer let Judy or me know-Call 682-3240






