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The Valley's Most Successful Affordable Low Income Home Builder

In 1993, Judy and I joined others in the movement to form Silver Valley Habitat for Humanity, Inc. [Now the **Silver Valley Fuller Center for Housing** (SVH)] At that time, I didn't believe it would work but believed it was worth trying. I was familiar with disappointing results of government built housing—those projects which too often resulted in deteriorating conditions by families who had been given something for nothing.

Millard and Linda Fuller's HfH movement enlisted volunteers to *help* low income families build their own homes and required the families to pay for them. It was hoped that after helping build their homes that they would be bonded to and maintain them.

Many founding members of SVH dreamed that *all* the selected families:

- 1) Would maintain their homes;
- 2) Would be able to maintain their mortgage payments;
- 3) Would later give some of their time and money helping other families build their homes.

Sixteen years later the results are:

- 1) All the houses appear to be in good shape, but a few of the yards are deplorable;
- 2) We may have to foreclose on one family; two others are a few months behind in their payments; eight are ahead of their scheduled payments; and four have paid off their homes early.
- 3) Most of the families support us with some time yearly.
- 4) But, so far, few are supporting us financially in addition to making their house payments.

Our homeowners seem to be turning out to be somewhat average home owners, which is disappointing to some of the dreams of the founding members.

- ❖ Financially the Silver Valley now has taxes being paid on over a million dollars (\$1,000,000) worth of homes because of us.
- ❖ Education wise, most of the children have done and are doing well in school—some in the top of their high school classes and some have graduated from college.
- ❖ Job wise, employers have more stable workers and with the confidence gained in the process of building their own homes, some community leaders have been produced.

So for me—the skeptic—I think we have been surprisingly successful. If you believe that homeownership is important to our community, please give your financial support *and* some volunteer time to the most successful affordable low income housing builder in the Silver Valley.

Homeowners will "pay forward" the cost of the repairs as they can afford it without interest to our Greater Blessings account to help with the next project. *If you want to donate specifically to this account, please indicate it on your check.*

We obviously need help since our construction crew is already shorthanded. So if you or a group of you can help on these small projects—fantastic! Get some of your friends together; organize a work party from an organization; use it as an opportunity for church outreach.

Those needing help will need to ask through our construction committee to see the feasibility of the project.

So, if you know of some small repair project that needs to be done for a needy party, let us know. **Also, if you are willing to help with such a project, let us know. (Perhaps this will help fulfill the "more" you need in your life.)**
